

September 2025 was a powerful and spirit-filled month for the Hands In Christian Service (HICS) Deaf Ministry at MSBUMC! We celebrated Deaf Awareness Month with inspiring guests, joyful music, and heartfelt learning that brought our church family even closer together.

We kicked off the month with a special guest speaker, Reverend Leo Yates, pastor of Magothy Church of the Deaf and Coordinator of Accessibility & Inclusion for the Baltimore-Washington Conference (now the Tidal Basin Conference). Reverend Yates delivered a powerful Word exploring the story of Zechariah—who was probably Deaf—and shared his own moving experiences growing up as a CODA (Child of Deaf Adults). His message touched many hearts and deepened our understanding of Deaf culture and faith.

Our Deaf friends also graced us with a beautiful signed performance of "Somebody Prayed for Me." They did such a good job that they were asked for an encore presentation on third Sunday —this time it was an amazing solo by Maynard King and we were blessed by his gifts!

Throughout the month, HICS led efforts to teach the MSB congregation practical signs to help connect with our Deaf community. Members learned greetings such as "Good Morning," "Nice to See You," and "Thank You," along with how to fingerspell their names to introduce themselves. The second Sunday's Coffee Hour provided a wonderful opportunity for everyone to practice—and it was truly heartwarming to witness MSB members engaging with Maynard, Ivy, Antonio, and Delitta on that Sunday and throughout the month, and moving forward.

On the fourth Sunday, HICS hearing members, and of course Maynard, signed the song "Send Your Power", showing a moving expression of unity in worship. But the true finale came from



one of our newest families, the Harden family. Uel, Vlana, and Wynora each introduced themselves in sign language and fingerspelled their names. Then they signed "Yes, Jesus Loves Me", together. Their mother, Madra, did a wonderful job teaching them to sign their names and signing the song. It was a beautiful moment that perfectly captured the love and connection we've built this month.



What is National Family Caregivers Month?

November is National Family Caregivers
Month in the United States. It's observed to
call attention to the hard work of more than 50
million family caregivers across the country.
During National Family Caregivers Month, we
raise awareness of the societal value provided
by caregivers and ask for greater support.

Who are family caregivers and what do they do?

Family caregivers provide care and assistance to a family member with limitations due to illness, injury or disability.

Family caregivers may provide many different types of support:

Personal Care: Bathing, personal hygiene, dressing and toileting; getting in and out of a bed or chair and walking. Meal preparation and feeding. Managing therapies and treatments. Arranging nursing and other medical supports. Performing basic medical tasks.

Medical Care: Organizing and giving medication. Managing and attending appointments and maintaining medical records and information.

Other Life Management Tasks: Shopping for food clothing and other essentials. Providing transportation or organizing transport. Managing finances, paying bills, planning for the future. Housekeeping and home maintenance. Managing communication with others. Arranging respite care providers.

Why do family caregivers deserve recognition? Family caregivers provide an enormous value to society. Their services often make it possible for their loved ones to remain at home. It usually fills a gap that would be astronomically expensive otherwise.

Caregiving can be tedious, repetitive, physically challenging and emotionally straining. For many caregivers, they sacrifice their own well-being to take care of their loved ones.

November is caregiver month, a time when family caregivers deserve recognition for the difficult and valuable work they are doing for their families.



Advent Is Here







Candles That Tell a Story

Lighting its candles each Sunday is a treasured tradition during the four weeks of Advent. Depending on denomination, churches use different color combinations for the candles. Some place four blue candles around the wreath with a white one in the center, while others use all white. Many light purple candles on the first two Sundays, pink on the third, purple again on the fourth, and then a large white candle on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day.

Each part of the wreath carries symbolic meaning:

- **The wreath**: Its circular shape represents the everlasting love of God, having no beginning or end. The green symbolizes eternal life.
- **The four candles**: Mark the four weeks of Advent. One tradition says that each candle also represents 1,000 years, totaling 4,000 years from Adam and Eve to Christ's birth.
- **Purple candles**: in ancient times, was expensive and was considered the color of royalty and kings. On Christmas, Christ is proclaimed King of Kings. Purple also symbolizes humility and penitence. The first purple candle represents Hope; the second, Peace; and the final purple candle, Love.
- **Blue candles**: Blue is another color often used as a symbol of royalty. Some churches use blue candles to symbolize the night sky and the anticipation of the announcement of Christ's birth. Blue also symbolizes the beginning of a new creation as in the waters of Genesis 1.
- **The pink candle:** Lit on the third Sunday, it represents Joy and marks the halfway point of Advent.
- **The white candle**: The large white candle in the center is the Christ candle. Its light symbolizes Christ the Savior "the light of the world."

The beauty and brightness from the glow of all five candles is a reminder that Christ's life was the light for all earth's people — "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it" (John 1:5, NRSV).

The Advent wreath is more than just greenery and candles—it's a symbol of watchfulness and growing joy as Christmas draws near.

Gift-Giving Solutions

Trying to find gifts for certain people — or letting others know what *you* want — can be quite challenging. After all, most of us don't need anything. 
Parkinson's is a chronic and progressive movement disorder that initially causes tremors in one hand, stiffness, or slowing of movement. Non-motor symptoms and associated conditions may include behavioral and cognitive problems, apathy, anxiety, depression, and sensory or sleep problems. There are more than 200,000 cases of Parkinson's per year, and it is more common in males with a family history. The average onset is after the age of sixty.

The exact cause of Parkinson's is unknown, but researchers believe a combination of genetic and environmental factors plays a role. Ongoing exposure to herbicides and pesticides may slightly increase your risk of Parkinson's disease. Because the cause of Parkinson's is unknown, there are not proven ways to prevent the disease. Some research has shown that people who consume caffeine get Parkinson's disease less than those who don't drink it. Currently, there is not enough evidence to suggest that drinking caffeinated beverages protects against Parkinson's.

Numerous medications are available that can relieve symptoms. The role of physical, occupational and speech therapy is very important. Surgery can be done in a few cases when decided by the specialist.

Shake and Freeze Day, an annual campaign to raise awareness of Parkinson's disease, is

held on December 21. Shake and Freeze Day is a powerful reminder of the importance of raising awareness and funding for Parkinson's research and patient support. By taking part in this annual campaign, you can help shine a light on the daily challenges faced by those with Parkinson's, supporting a movement dedicated to finding a cure.
